


Why the Russian Constitution Matters Book Launch

Once he takes office in January, President-elect Donald Trump hopes to follow Vladimir Putin in building a system of strongman governance.

William Partlett's new book <u>Why the Russian Constitution</u> <u>Matters</u> (2024, Bloomsbury Publishing), examines the constitutional details of this strongman project. It describes how today's strongmen rely on a technique that Partlett calls the "constitutional dark arts". This is the argument that the constitutional centralisation of power in one leader is a better way to secure democracy, sovereignty and economic development than a system of democratic checks and balances.



This centralisation of power has allowed strongmen like Vladimir Putin in Russia, Viktor Orban in Hungary and Recep Tayyip Erdogan in Turkey to co-opt democratic institutions such as courts, political parties, legislatures and elections and use them to legitimise their own leadership.

But, over time, the constitutional dark arts does not achieve its stated goals. It instead leads to increasingly dysfunctional authoritarianism, poor economic growth, and national security.

In examining the constitutional dark arts, the talk will examine: How has Putin weaponised the centralisation of constitutional power to build his own personal power? What are the implications for Russia today and after Putin leaves office? How precisely will Trump attempt to build this strongman model in the United States and how can it be resisted?

William Partlett is an Associate Professor at Melbourne Law School. He has travelled extensively in Russia and the former Soviet Union. His written work on the region includes publications in both academic journals as well as The Conversation and The National Interest. His insights draw on both his training in Russian politics, language, and history at Oxford University and Princeton University as well as his legal training at Stanford Law School. He is the author of The Post-Soviet as Post-Colonial (Edward Elgar Publishing, 2022), which explores the post-colonial status of Russia and the former Soviet Union.



Dr Robert Horvath is a specialist in Russian Politics. His most recent book, Putin's Fascists: Russkii Obraz and the Politics of Managed Nationalism in Russia, focuses on the link between the Putin regime and radical nationalism in Russia. Horvath is currently pursuing research into the Putin regime's manipulation of Russian nationalism, its assault on international human rights institutions, and its intervention in Africa. His commentary has been published in The Age, The Australian, The Conversation, The Lowy Interpreter, and The Canberra Times. He has appeared on ABC's Four Corners, the BBC World News, Channel 9's Under Investigation and A Current Affair.



Petr Kuzmin is the official representative of the Anti-Corruption Foundation established by the late Alexey Navalny to investigate corruption within the Russian state in 2011. The ACF has become the biggest pro-democracy political organisation in Russia. Its staff was forced into exile in 2021 when it was designated an "extremist organisation" by Vladimir Putin. Petr Kuzmin is a Russian-Australian antiwar activist holding a weekly perpetual anti-war picket action in Melbourne since the start of the Russian invasion of Ukraine. He became a coordinator of the #FreeNavalny campaign in Australia in May 2023 and remains the official representative of Navalny's team.
